	Revitalising curriculum: Students working on community-based problems that matter		
	Young people face urgent problems for sustainable social and planetary futures. Many students already name and act on such issues; e.g. by participating in Schools Strikes For Climate Change. Thought and action on care for viable futures should be made curricular.		
	In this keynote, we outline and advocate a major re-purposing of curriculum that allocates significant time for student work on what we called 'Problems that Matter' (PTMs). Students would collaborate with local community members, teachers and university academics to identify PTMs in their life-worlds. This student-led collaboration would then extend to curriculum projects that gather diverse community, school and academic people and their knowledges together around efforts to understand and act on PTMs.		
	We argue for PTM projects not as 'extra-curricular', but as core to
